## **LETTER FROM THE DIRECTORS**

**E**very two years the St. Louis County Board of Election Commissioners (BOEC) provides a report of recent activity and highlights. Included is voter information, cost of elections, results and voter turnout statistics. Previous Biennial Reports are available on our website: [stlouisco.com/elections](http://stlouisco.com/elections).

In 2008, Missouri broke its long tradition of voting for the winner of the presidential election. With the loss of Missouri's swing state status, much of the spotlight for the 2012 race for President shifted away from Missouri to other swing states. Attention was focused on the highly challenged U.S. Senate race and other statewide contests.

During 2011, decennial census data was used by the State of Missouri for the constitutionally required redistricting. As the population fluctuates, district lines must be redrawn to provide equitable representation for all citizens. After the 2010 Census Reapportionment, Missouri lost one electoral vote. The St. Louis region lost one Congressional district, three State Representative districts and reallocated one State Senate district. This adjustment rippled through other districts in St. Louis County. The county's seven State Senate seats remained, but all boundary lines were drastically redrawn. Senate district 4 is primarily located in St. Louis City. Most of the St. Louis County population was affected by redistricting.

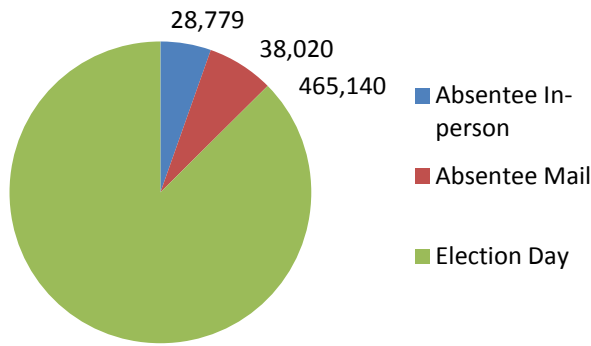
In 2011, the City of St. George (incorporated in 1948) voted to dissolve itself and become a part of unincorporated St. Louis County. The City of St. George, a fourth class city, was then granted disincorporation effective midnight December 31<sup>st</sup> in accordance with an order from the St. Louis County Council.

We have often heard the phrase, "What do you do when there is no election?" Our response is, "Prepare for the next one." Four elections were held in 2011 and six in 2012 including the November general election. Voting equipment preparation, voter list maintenance, preparing maps, maintaining compliance with the Missouri Ethics Commission's requirements, programming elections, recruiting and staffing the polls, delivering supplies and serving the public are all tasks that must be accomplished before each Election.



## Ballots Cast

November 2012



If you have previously visited our office to cast an absentee ballot for an election, you may have noted that the space dedicated to voting is quite limited. In most elections, the space available is adequate for both voters and voting equipment, but for a presidential election there is simply not enough room to process the hundreds of voters that arrive daily. For the November 2012 election, 28,779 in-person voters were processed in the 42 days prior to the election. That averages 685 voters per day. For the first time ever, the Board decided that the absentee voting process should be moved to a larger facility. With the assistance of the County Council and other St. Louis County departments, we were able to identify, acquire funding and equip a 5,800 square foot building about 100 yards from the BOEC's main office. This "satellite location" allowed us to utilize 40 touch-screen voting machines and have room for an increased number of voter check-in stations. The total time voters spent casting their absentee ballots was reduced significantly.

The BOEC received and tabulated 38,020 absentee mail ballots for the November 2012 general election. The monumental task of opening, preparing and counting these ballots began on October 31<sup>st</sup> and continued through Election Day. A bi-partisan team reviewed each absentee ballot envelope before opening. Once opened, the ballot was visually inspected for tears and stray markings in order for the tabulating equipment to read the ballot without error. Operating our "satellite location", opening absentee ballots and managing the day-to-day office responsibilities were tasks performed simultaneously. This time intensive process involved the hard work of 72 full-time employees and 61 temporary clerical staff.

The 2012 election cycle reached its peak on November 6<sup>th</sup>. Close to 6,000 poll workers and field support personnel arrived at the 449 polling places and other assigned locations beginning at 5:00 a.m. to assist the 465,140 voters that cast their ballots on Election Day. Lines were long but careful planning, hard work of all involved and the patience of the electorate resulted in a successful outcome for St. Louis County.

For most people, the election was over on November 6<sup>th</sup>. However, state law requires the BOEC to certify all election results within 14 days of an election. During this period, the BOEC staff verified the validity of 2,170 provisional ballots that were submitted (upon verification, 34% were counted); performed hand counts as mandated by the State; completed a post-election audit and issued voters credit for ballots cast. Once these final steps were completed, the Board of Election Commissioners certified the election results and submitted them to the Secretary of State.

In 2012 the BOEC was able to hold total costs of the 4 countywide elections to 4.1 million dollars, this includes the additional cost associated with the "absentee satellite location." Our professional staff faced many challenges in 2012, but continued to perform beyond expectations. Our slogan is "We are the biggest, we must be the best."

The BOEC is constantly looking at new and emerging technology to improve the voting process while maintaining accuracy and voter privacy. We welcome feedback from the community on how to improve the Election Day experience. We consider it a pleasure to serve the voters of St. Louis County.

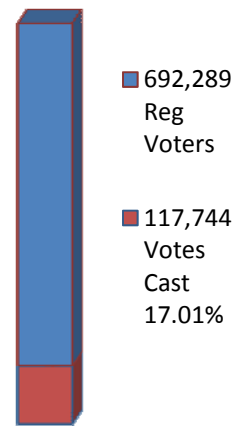

# Election Summaries

In Missouri, there are five authorized election days per year; the Tuesday following the first Monday in February, April, June, August and November. A county-wide election requires the coordination of multiple factors. Each of the 446-450 polling places needs to be staffed with 6 to 8 (up to 14 in a presidential election) Poll Workers. Ballots need to be printed and voting equipment needs to be delivered to the polls. The following summaries include the costs associated with the ten elections held in 2011 and 2012.

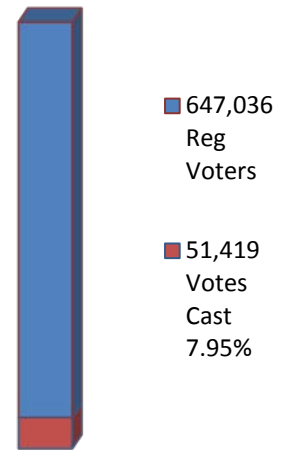

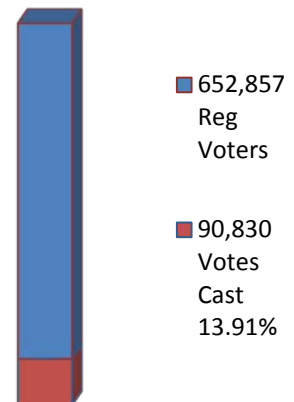

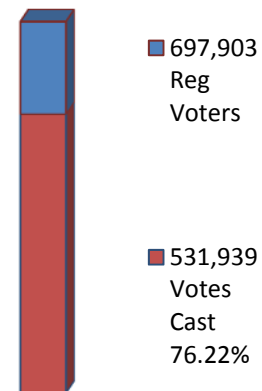

# Legislative Changes

**2010:** HB 2260 allows for voters in federal service or for civilians overseas to receive an absentee ballot by email, fax or mail. Only federal service voters in identified hostile environments are authorized to return their voted ballot via fax or email. This entire process can be monitored by the voter to ensure that their ballot was received.

**2011:** HB 217 authorized the use of electronic signature books at all polling places (RSMo 115.230). This has the potential of reducing costs in future elections as a countywide election uses approximately 100,000 pages of paper and nearly 200 man hours to assemble approximately 1,800 signature books.

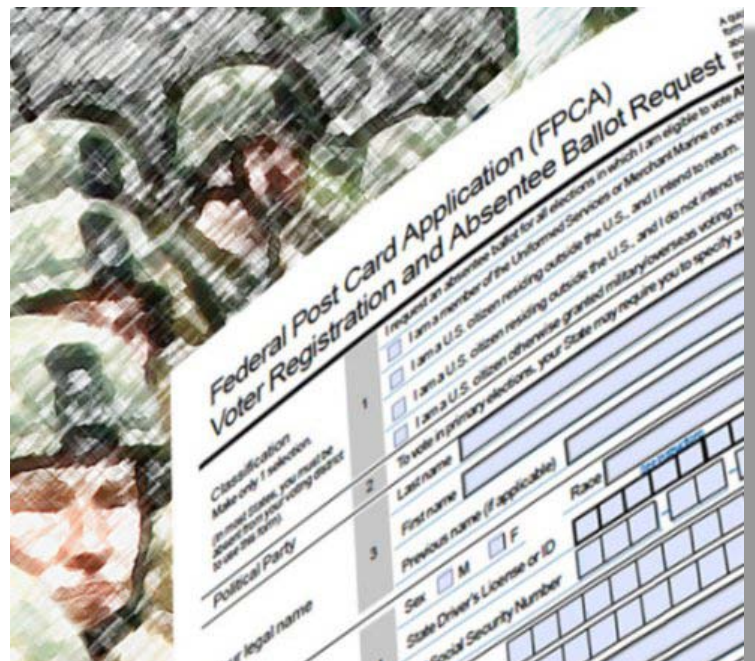
## Federal Service and Overseas Voters

The BOEC maintains regular communication with federal service members, overseas voters and their spouses and dependents to ensure they receive a ballot for every eligible election.

We emailed 1,373 ballots for the November 2012 general election of which 67.58% were returned by Election Day.

The electronic transmission of ballots is expected to increase over the next several years.

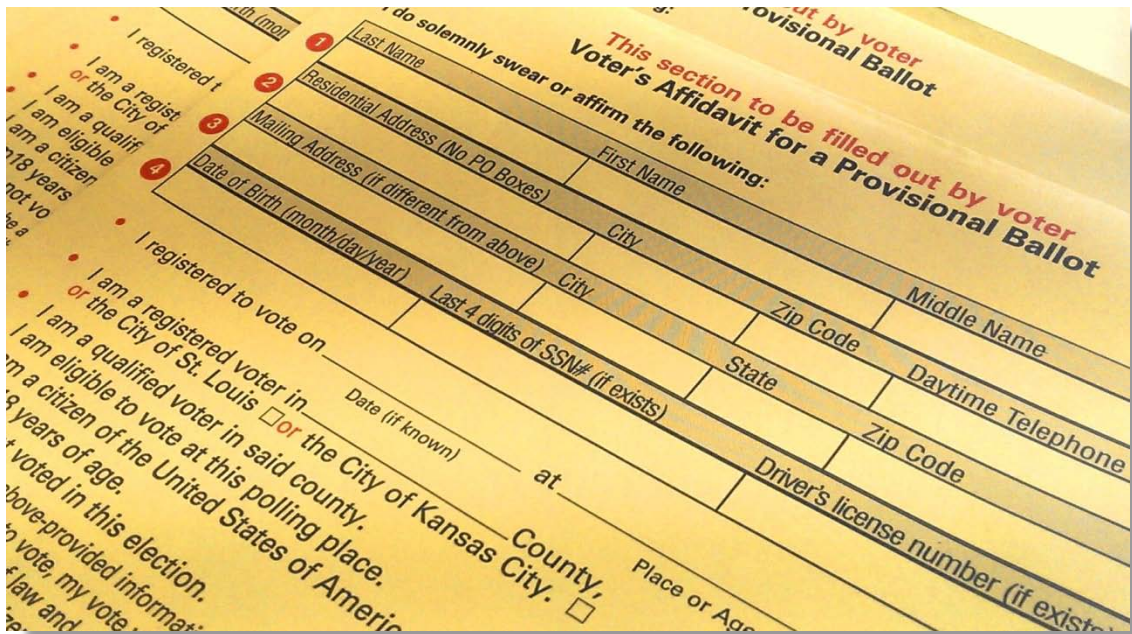
# Provisional Voting

Provisional ballots are used in primary and general elections where candidates for federal or statewide offices are nominated or elected and any election where a statewide issue or issues are submitted to the voters (RSMo 115.430).

The purpose of issuing a provisional ballot is to offer those voters whose eligibility cannot be immediately determined, a chance to vote. This ballot is sealed in an affidavit envelope and kept separate from the other Election Day ballots. Provisional ballots are reviewed by BOEC staff within 14 days after the election. If the voter is determined to be qualified, the ballot is approved, counted and added to the Election Day totals.

There were 1,433 rejected provisional ballots. The two most common reasons for denial were not being registered (1,030) and appearance at the wrong polling place (244).

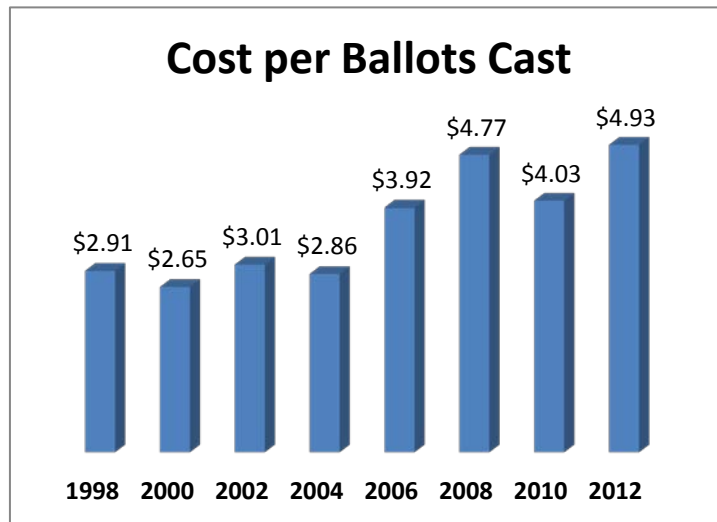
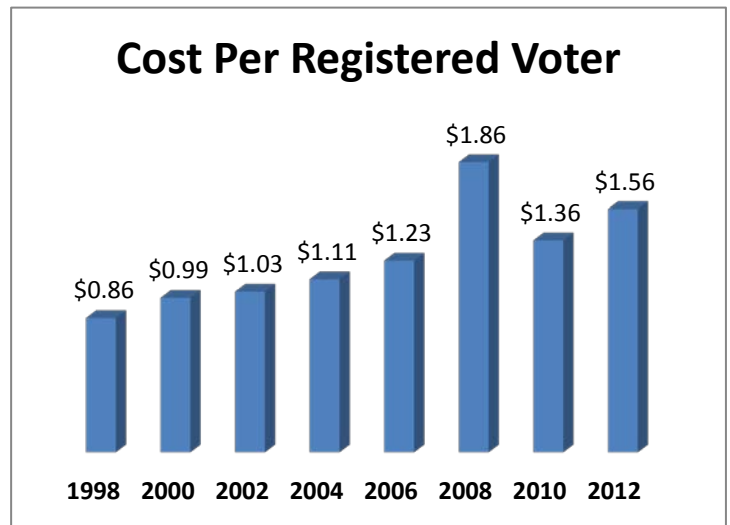
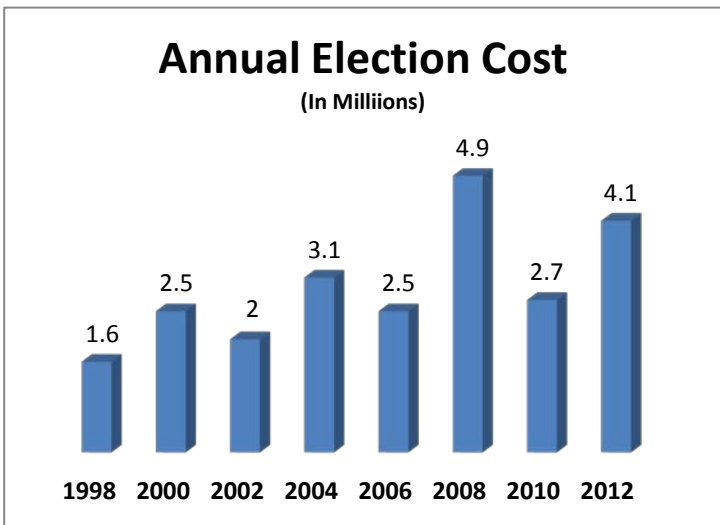
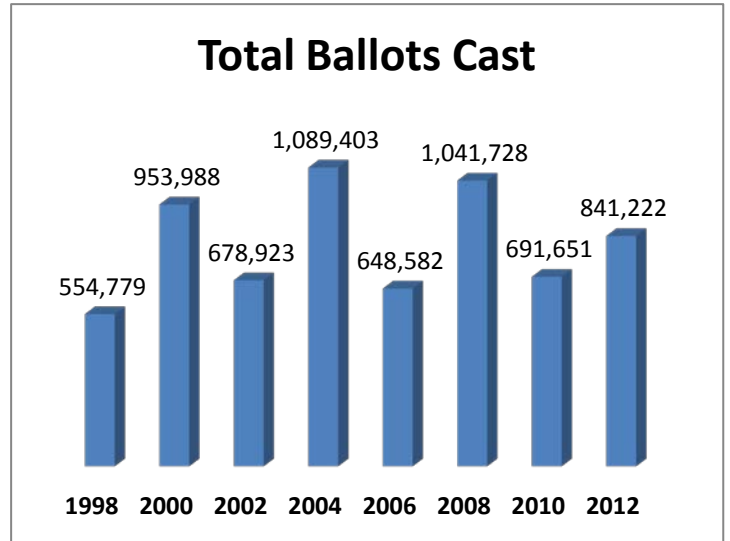
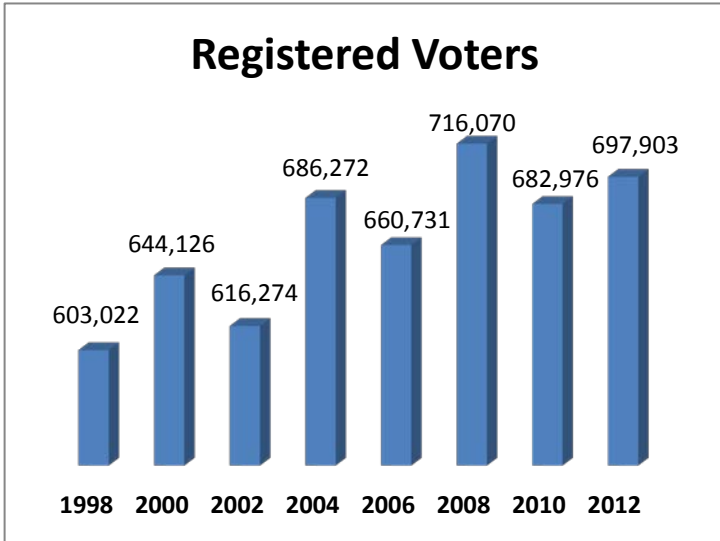
# General Election Voter Turnout by Township 2006 – 2012

**James (Jimmy) F. Loomis, III**

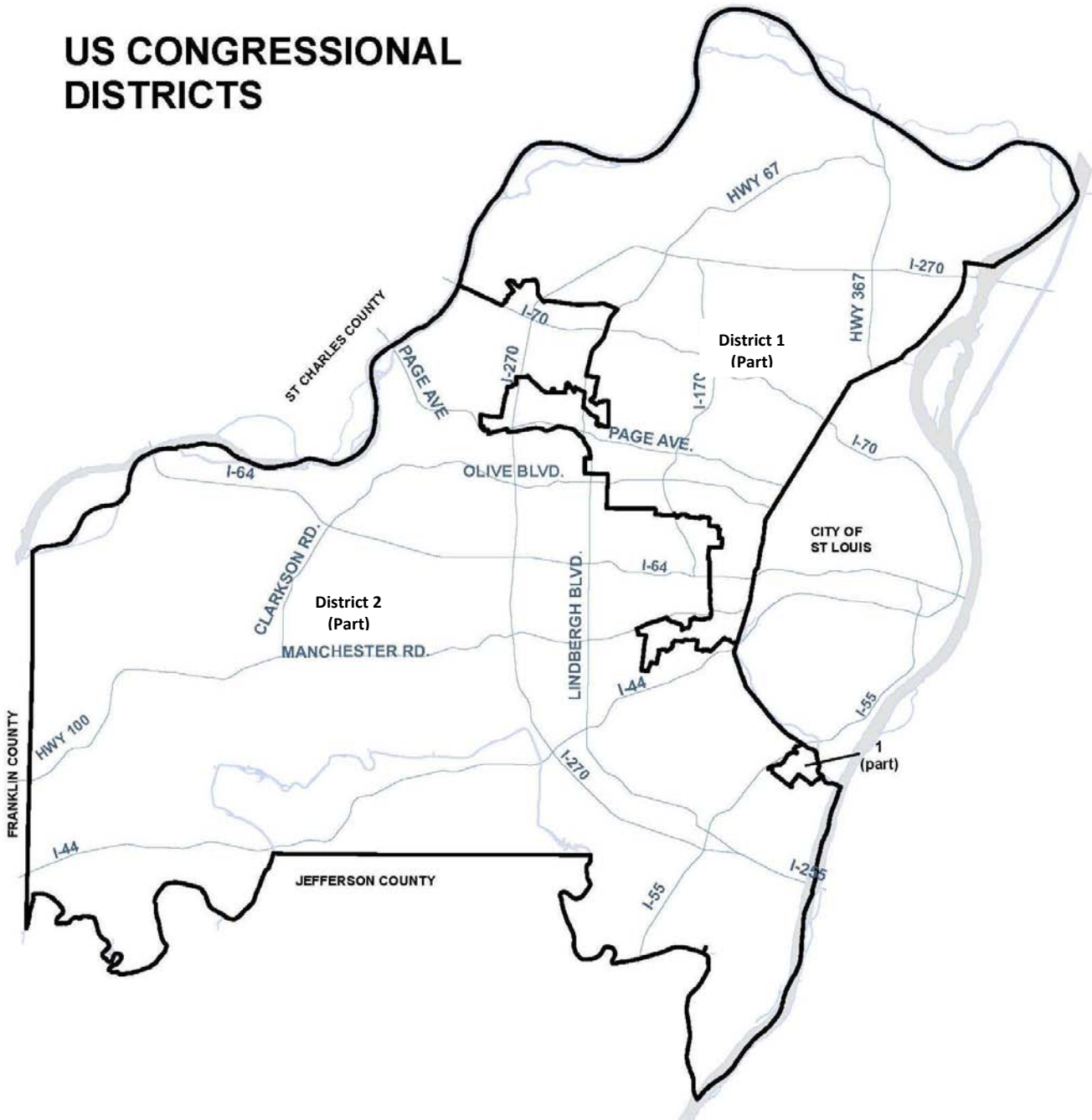
Age 18

His first involvement with politics was at age 12 when he petitioned the City of Ladue to begin a recycling campaign. This recycling program was adopted in 2006.

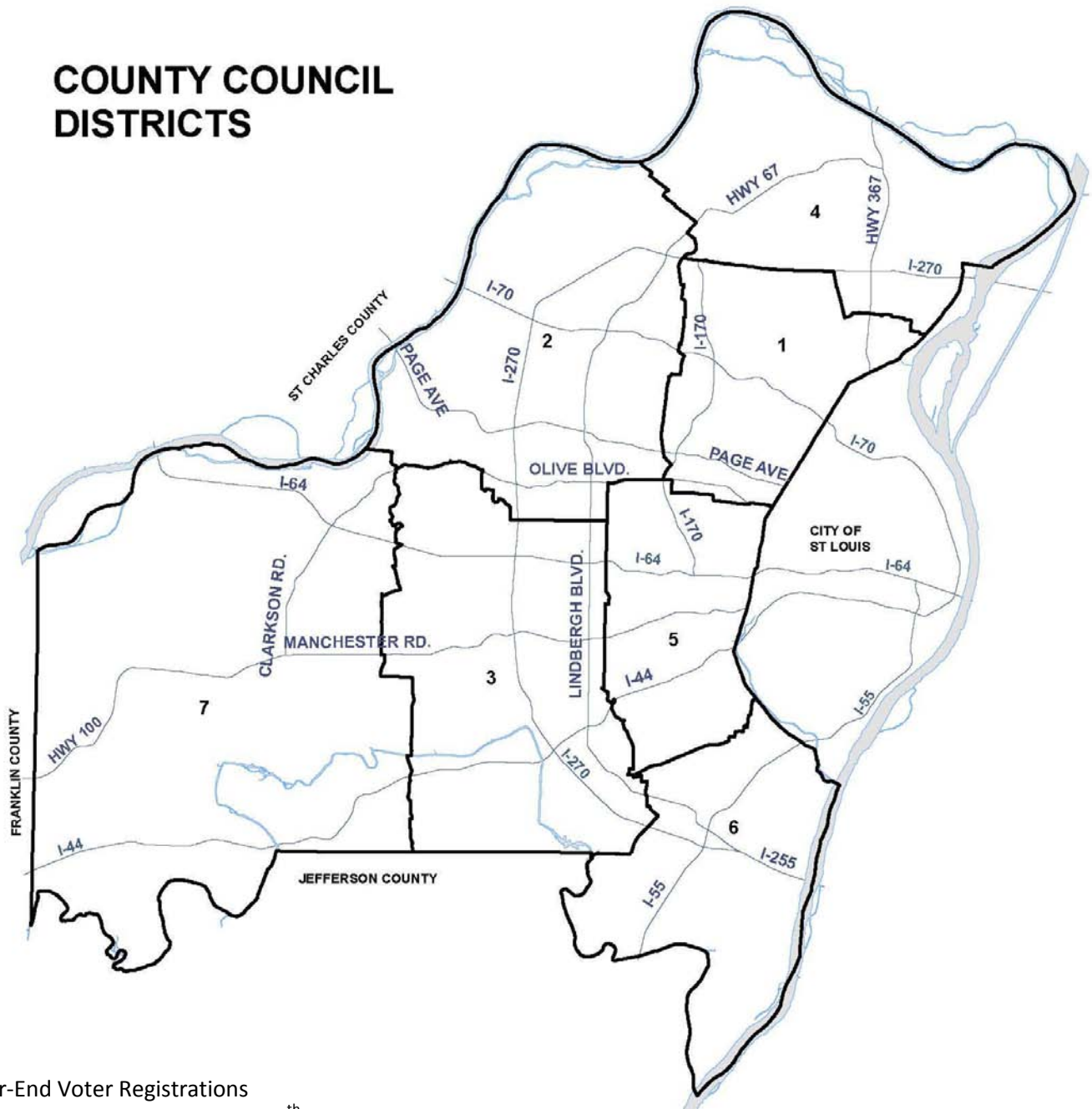

The Absentee Satellite Location opened early in October to accommodate the large volume of in-person absentee voters for the general election.



Voters were able to update their registration (if needed) and review candidates and issues on their ballot before reaching the voting booth.

Our staff was able to process an average of 685 voters each day during the absentee voting period. The peak voting day was November 2, when 2,147 voters came to cast their ballot.



Several voters remarked that even though there was a huge voter turnout, the positive voting experience was unprecedented.
